

Eric S. Rosengren
President and Chief Executive Officer

Eric S. Rosengren became President and Chief Executive Officer of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston on July 23, 2007. He serves as a voting member of the Federal Open Market Committee. Previously, Rosengren was executive vice president and head of the Bank's department of supervision, regulation, and credit. An economist by training, he joined the Bank in 1985 as a member of the research department. As executive vice president, Rosengren was responsible for overseeing the discount window, the statistics function, enterprise risk management, and business continuity, as well as the supervision of bank holding companies and state member banks in the First Federal Reserve District. He established a unit that provides System leadership in quantitative risk modeling, and he provided national leadership in the implementation of Basel II, international capital standards for banks. In his research, Rosengren has made significant contributions in the fields of banking and monetary policy, and he has written extensively on macroeconomics, international banking, bank supervision, and risk management. He has served as an advisor on Japanese banking issues, and a focus of his research has been how financial problems can impact the real economy. Rosengren holds a B.A. from Colby College and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin, Madison.
